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DEPLOYMENT FOR TRAINING PROGRAM

CHAPTER 1: GENERAL

1-1. PURPOSE. This regulation prescribes policy and procedures for administering the United States Southern Command (USSOUTHCOM) Deployment for Training (DFT) Program. This regulation applies to all United States Department of Defense (U.S. DOD) forces assigned, attached, augmenting, training, or serving temporary duty (TDY) within the USSOUTHCOM Theater of Operation (TO). This includes all Component Services and United States Military Groups/other Security Assistance Organizations (SAO's) operating within the USSOUTHCOM Area of Responsibility (AOR).

1-2. SUPPLEMENTATION. Supplements to this regulation are prohibited without prior written approval by the USSOUTHCOM J3-Exercise Division (SCJ3-DDX).

1-3. OBJECTIVES. The objectives of the DFT program include the following:

- a. Provide military units valuable training opportunities consistent with their Mission Essential Task List (METL), while supporting USSOUTHCOM objectives in the region.
- b. Improve the combat readiness of participating U.S. units and increase unit/individual training levels.
- c. Improve U.S. capability to conduct unilateral or combined operations in the theater.
- d. Maintain U.S. presence to support regional stability.
- e. Continue development of regional ties through improved military-to-military relations.
- f. Conduct humanitarian and civic assistance in conjunction with military operations.
- g. Enhance the image of the U.S. in the theater.

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CHAPTER 2: DEPLOYMENTS FOR TRAINING (DFT's)

2-1. DEFINITION.

a. A DFT is any unit or individual deployment into USSOUTHCOM's AOR for the primary purpose of training U.S. forces.

b. The DFT program does not include unit training that is managed and funded under the JCS Exercise program.

c. The DFT program provides CONUS and Panama based units the opportunity to conduct deployment, training and redeployment activities in austere and remote areas of Central and South America.

d. Security assistance and LATAM-COOP Program related training activities do not fall within the purview of the DFT program.

e. Benefits derived from a DFT by a host country, its populace or military are strictly ancillary to the primary purpose of the DFT Program.

2-2. TYPE. DFT's are primarily small unit deployments, and are ideally suited for training the unit's METL while serving selected USSOUTHCOM regional goals. DFT's feature short duration, low cost, a small number of personnel, and the ability to conduct training desirable both to the U.S. unit deploying and the host nation. Further they permit access to countries which could not accommodate a larger U.S. force presence. DFT activities significantly enhance USCINCSO's regional strategy objectives.

2-3. DFT Approval Process

a. All DFT's must be approved by SCJ3-EX to ensure they are consistent with CINCSO's Regional strategy, the Country Team/U.S.Ambassador's Five (5) Year Country Plan, the current political/military situation in the Host Nation, and that the legal status of the deploying U.S. personnel has been satisfactorily established.

b. Given the prioritized Country Team/MILGROUP three year training opportunities forecast, component/services submit their proposed two year DFT programs NLT one (1) August for the next two fiscal years' deployment. For example, the FY91 and FY92 DFT program was due one (1) August 90.

c. SCJ3-DDX will provide conditional approval of proposed DFT's in message format, pending the submission of completed terms of reference (TOR) by the component. A DFT will not receive a final approval, in message format, until submission of a complete TOR. Changes to a TOR may be adopted throughout the year, and will be considered on a case by case basis. Changes or updates to DFT's are made through SCJ3-DDX approval of a modified TOR. (See Appendix A) Components/services must request a theater clearance from SCJ3-DDX thirty (30) days prior to the deployment of units or personnel to conduct an approved DFT or site survey.

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d. SCJ3-DDX is responsible for coordinating proposed DFT's with the USSOUTHCOM Joint Staff.

e. DFT Identification/Tracking numbers will be assigned to a DFT by the Component/Service/USSOUTHCOM Agency responsible for managing, monitoring, and tracking that DFT. The USSOUTHCOM Deployment Identification/Tracking System will be utilized. Only one ID/Tracking number will be assigned to a particular deployment. Once assigned, that number will not be changed without SCJ3-DDX approval. The Identification Lettering system in Appendix B will be used to identify the type of DFT.

f. The numbering system consists of a four digit number. The first digit in the ID number is the last number of the fiscal year in which the deployment will begin. The succeeding numbers will be assigned based upon the order of submission by the component.

g. The following is a sample DFT Identification/Tracking Number:

CN 2023 is a Counter Drug Managed/Related Deployment. It begins during FY92. This is the 23rd CN related deployment for FY92.

2-4. Terms of Reference (TOR): It is a detailed description of the concept of operations for a particular deployment. Every deployment/DFT must have an approved TOR. Once approved by SCJ3-DDX, the TOR constitutes the acceptable conditions and implied limitations for the associated DFT. Upon SCJ3-DDX approval, elements of the TOR will not be changed without coordination with and approval of SCJ3-DDX. (See Appendix A).

2-5. SECURITY CLASSIFICATION OF DFT.

a. The Respective Service/Component has the initial security classification authority/responsibility for all their Deployments. Special Operations DFT's are the responsibility of the Commander, SOCSOUTH.

b. The classification proposed in the TOR will be approved or modified prior to final approval by SOUTHCOM. Efforts will be made to classify DFT's at the lowest level consistent with DOD Regulation 5200.1R and the threat in the host nation.

2-6. RULES OF ENGAGEMENT. JCS Peacetime rules of engagement (ROE) pertain to all DFT's. Components/Services/Agencies managing the DFT will coordinate with country teams and ensure that personnel deploying under the DFT program have been properly briefed on the ROE and threat conditions in the country/area to which they deploy.

2-7. THREAT/RISK ASSESSMENT. Components/services with SCJ2 and country team/MILGROUUP input/review will conduct a threat/risk assessment of the host nation and training area as part of the DFT planning process. Countries/locations that are identified as having medium or high threat conditions will require an evacuation plan for the DFT be published and on file with the host US country team/MILGROUUP or Embassy. No DFT/TOR will be approved by SCJ3-DDX for a medium or high threat location without an evacuation plan.

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CHAPTER 3: ADMINISTRATION

3-1. CONCEPT.

a. Deployment for Training opportunities in theater are initially identified and developed by USSOUTHCOM country teams/MILGROUPS as an integral part of their five year country plan. The training opportunities are written in a draft terms of reference (TOR) format and allow for a coherent matching of military training that complements CINCSO strategies and Milgroup initiatives.

b. The Country Team/MILGROUPS identify training opportunities for a minimum of three out years with the next FY-training year in detail and each of the two follow on out-years being in less detail.

c. Annually SCJ5 Pol/Mil reviews and prioritizes the training opportunities developed by the country team/MILGROUPS during the Country Plan Review Process. The Prioritized/Ranked training opportunities are submitted to the SCJ3-DDX DFT Manager. The manager compiles all training listed in theater and distributes same to USSOUTHCOM Components/Services with time lines for resourcing and coordination as listed in the DFT Planning Cycle in Chapter 4.

d. Upon receipt of the SCJ3-DDX two out-year theater training opportunities listing, the component/service will resource those opportunities that support the training needs of member units and/or personnel. For the training opportunity that the component/service desires to utilize the draft TOR is completed. The nominated training opportunity TOR is returned to SCJ3-DDX by the component/service. At this time, the TOR may only contain notional units and/or estimated time frames. The nominated training TOR's when conditionally approved by SCJ3-DDX become the frame work for the next two FY out-year DFT programs. The proposed DFT's for the next FY out-year are refined by the component/services and completed TOR's are submitted to SCJ3-DDX for final approval no less than ninety days prior to deployment.

3-2. RESPONSIBILITIES.

a. SCJ3 will:

- (1) Coordinate/Administer the DFT Program for USSOUTHCOM
- (2) Approve TORs for all DFT's
- (3) Issue Theater Clearances for all DFT's
- (4) Monitor all deployments within the USSOUTHCOM Theater.

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(5) Visit training sites as appropriate.

(6) Provide POC within the Exercise Division, Joint Training Branch, (SCJ3-DDX), Telephone 282-4901.

b. SCJ5 will:

(1) Insure the three out-year training opportunity forecast is published by country team/Milgroups annually.

(2) Prioritize training opportunities as submitted by country teams/MILGROUPS and submit to SCJ3.

c. SCJA will:

(1) Review all completed TOR's to ensure that the legal status of the deployment and deploying US Forces has been satisfactorily established.

(2) Provide to DFT managers timely legal guidance on areas of legal review or consideration on the deployment of US personnel or fiscal policy.

d. U.S. Country Teams/MILGROUPS or U.S. Military Forces Commanders in country will:

(1) Develop/revise annually the in country three out-year training opportunities as part of their five year country plan.

(2) Submit training opportunities in draft TOR format to SCJ5.

(3) Be the DFT Program Manager for the US Ambassador in the HN.

(4) Be the focal point for US Ambassador and HN DFT TOR approval.

(5) Ensure that the DFT program supports CINC's SOUTHCOM Theater Strategy Objectives and the Five (5) Year HN Country Plan.

(6) Provide command and control for deployed forces as directed.

(7) Ensure deployed DFT Unit/Personnel are properly briefed on HN threat levels, security procedures in country, ROE, and human rights issues/policies.

(8) Submit Weekly, Quarterly reports and deployment reports as described in Chapter 5.

e. SOUTHCOM Service/Component DFT managers will:

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(1) Be responsible for planning, coordinating and executing their Service DFT program.

(2) Forward to SCJ3-DDX IAW Chapter 4 (Development Cycle), Coordinated/Approved DFT TORS for their service.

(3) Be the focal point between SCJ3-DDX and their service for DFT program management.

(4) Develop and maintain component specific Deployment SOPs and Checklists. The SOP will at a minimum contain Predeployment, Deployment and Redeployment Checklist and Milestones Sections.

(5) Submit a request for a Theater Clearance to SCJ3-DDX and a Country Clearance Request to the country MILGROUP thirty days prior to the deployment of units or personnel to conduct an approved DFT or site survey.

(6) SOUTHCOM Component/Service DFT Managers are listed in Appendix E.

f. The Deployment DFT CDR will:

(1) Ensure successful execution of the Deployment mission through completion of the USSOUTHCOM Service/Component DFT SOP/Checklist for Predeployment, Deployment and Redeployment.

(2) Ensure complete and thorough review and analysis of mission, HN threat level, security requirements, logistical requirements, and human rights awareness training.

(3) Provide deployment after action report to the MILGROUP Cdr/Ambassador, and a copy to SCJ3-DDX and the respective Service/Component representative at USSOUTHCOM.

3-3. OFFICE OF PRIMARY RESPONSIBILITIES (OPR's). The following USSOUTHCOM OPR'S are available to assist service/components as needed in the coordination and management of all DFT's.

3-4. COMMUNICATIONS. The unit conducting the DFT has the primary responsibility to meet the communication requirements for the location in which the DFT is to be conducted. The service/component will provide the necessary equipment to meet command and control requirements.

3-5. MEDICAL. The unit conducting the DFT is responsible for arranging and coordinating all medical requirements, including MEDEVAC. Components will ensure that medical requirements are included as a specific item on their respective deployment checklist.

3-6. LOGISTICS. Logistics is a service responsibility. The unit conducting the DFT is responsible for arranging and coordinating all logistical requirements, including resupply.

3-7. TRANSPORTATION.

a. Transportation of deploying forces is a service responsibility. SCJ4 will provide assistance, as required.

b. Normally the deploying unit requests transportation support through its support channels.

c. Local transportation support shall be fully coordinated with in-country forces during site surveys.

3-8. FUNDING.

a. DFTs will be funded with service/component funds. With the exception of Title X HCA funds and Title X Developing Country Combined Exercise Program (DCCEP) funds, these funds will be coordinated with SCJ3-DDX, SCJ3-CA and the service components.

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b. Deploying units will not exceed funding authorization without the written approval of the respective service component DFT managers.

c. Service/component DFT managers will prioritize and budget for all DFT's based on SCJ3-DDX's guidance.

3-9. PUBLIC AFFAIRS GUIDANCE (PAG).

a. A PAG is required for each DFT. The PAG begins as proposed guidance at the resourcing command level and is coordinated with SCJ3, SCJ5, SCJA, SCPA and the American Embassy through the MILGROUP in the host nation.

b. The OSD-PA suspense for all required coordination and transmission of concurrences or recommended interagency modifications is 15 days prior to the start date of the DFT. Upon conclusion of coordination, approved guidance will be transmitted to all interested parties.

c. The guidance will consider host nation sensitivities, geopolitical factors, existing policies concerning military activities in LATAM, and other factors that may impact on national and international perceptions of the DFT.

d. The proposed PAG will normally provide a listing of pertinent references, articulate general public affairs policy, designate a public affairs spokespersons, provide declassification guidance, and recommend a text release with questions and answers. The PAG may be on a response to query basis, depending on the nature of the DFT.

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CHAPTER 4. DEVELOPMENT CYCLE

4-1. Theory. Ideally, a DFT is planned well in advance to ensure maximum training by the deploying force. Overseas deployments require substantial lead time for coordination, concept development, deployment of site survey teams, and development of transportation requirements. To facilitate the planning process, a two year development cycle will be followed.

4-2. Updating. On October 1 of each fiscal year (FY), one year will be added to the planning cycle.

4-3. USSOUTHCOM DFT Planning Cycle Milestones. The following are the SOUTHCOM DFT Planning Cycle Milestones.

4-5. IMPLEMENTATION.

a. Upon approval by the supporting CINC and the resourcing command, a deploying unit is selected and authorized direct coordination with SOUTHCOM Components and USMILGROUPS. The selected unit or its higher headquarters will coordinate with the U.S. Military Force Commander/USMILGROUP, plan and conduct predeployment site surveys, identify required transportation and support, and complete coordination prior to deployment.

b. During a predeployment site survey, the following areas should be developed: Command and control, logistics support, HCA plans, medical support, communication support, training sites, and coordination of training plans. A copy of predeployment site survey/trip report will be forwarded to HQ, USSOUTHCOM, SCJ3-DDX, APO Miami 34003.

c. Transportation requirements will be identified and requested as early as possible. Transportation normally represents the most expensive cost element for funding.

d. Support provided in-country, to the deploying unit, should be clearly defined and supported by the concept of operation. Host nation support varies greatly from nation to nation. Combined operations increase the potential for successful coordination of HN support.

e. Complete coordination during predeployment site survey. Do not change TOR, as validated, without SCJ3-DDX message approval.

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CHAPTER 5: REPORTS

5-1. QUARTERLY REPORTS. The quarterly report is initiated in the country hosting the deployment for training. It is prepared by the USMILGP/SAO or U.S. Military Forces Commander and submitted to SCJ3-DDX. Its primary purpose is to ensure information reported to JCS reflects current coordination between the US Government USG and host country. The Quarterly report is required 25 days prior to the start of each calendar quarter. It may include reference to all information established in the TOR. However, as a minimum, it must report the file number and security classification of the DFT, deployment dates, location of training, mission of training, number of U.S. troops and status of country approval.

5-2. PREDEPLOYMENT SITE SURVEY REPORT. Upon completion of predeployment site survey, the deploying unit or headquarters conducting the survey shall forward a copy of its predeployment site survey to Headquarters, USSOUTHCOM, SCJ3-DDX, APO Miami 34003. The Report should include:

- a. Narrative trip report.
- b. Concept of operations coordinated (should be in conformance with established TOR).
- c. Schedule of training site activities.
- d. Support required and logistics plan to include projected Class VIII requirements.
- e. Problems.

5-3. DEPLOYMENT REPORTS. These reports confirm the arrival and departure of a scheduled DFT (Initial Deployment Report, Final Deployment Report), and they report weekly on the progress of the DFT. Elements of Information to be included in the report are listed below:

- a. Unit.
- b. Deployment ID/Tracking Number.
- c. Start Date.
- d. End Date.
- e. Executive Summary (what is happening and planned).

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- f. Number of Personnel Deployed
- g. Changes to Training Mission
- h. Location of Training Site (name, direction, and distance from nearest town).
- i. Number of Host Nation Personnel Participating.

Information required in Deployment Reports may be included in USMILGP/U.S. Force Commander's Weekly Situation Report (SITREP). Situation Reports should be transmitted NLT 1800Z hours on Tuesday of each week.

5-4. AFTER ACTION REPORT. Upon completion of the DFT, deploying Unit/Headquarters is required to provide copy of after action report to the U.S. Military Commander in country/USMILGP and Headquarters, USSOUTHCOM, SCJ3-DDX, APO Miami 34003. Substantive comments on Human Rights (Positive or Negative) will be a part of the AAR.

5-5. SECRETARY OF DEFENSE (SECDEF) NOTIFICATION.

- a. A report to SECDEF is required 15 days prior to a deployment in or near a politically sensitive area, as identified in SM-815-81.
- b. The report required is a Significant Military Exercise Brief (SMEB) and will be prepared by the service component headquarters with assistance from SCJ3-DDX.

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APPENDIX A

TERMS OF REFERENCE (TOR) FORMAT

The following information will be in all terms of reference submitted to SCJ3-DDX.

1. Subject - Must include reason for submittal. (i.e. initial, change, or update.)

2. Date - Date TOR submitted.

a. ID Number - Must be submitted; no TOR will be approved without ID. (Refer to para 2-3 e-g, and appendix B, SC Reg 350-3.)

b. Country - (Refer to Appendix C, Section B, SC Reg 350-3.)

c. Startdate - mm/dd/yy.

d. Enddate - mm/dd/yy..

e. Location - Should be as specific as possible.

f. Unit - Should be as specific as possible.

g. Mission - If CN related, be sure to state that.

h. Troops - Number of troops that will participate; if there will be varying numbers participating, try to pinpoint numbers by timeframe. It is important that changes to TOR reflect number of troops that the change addresses, and, in parenthesis, the total number of troops in the deployment.

i. Component - Active, Reserve, or Guard.

j. Service - Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Army.

k. Statcode - In relation to MILGROUP approval; Approved or Pending.

l. Statdate - The effective date of the status in (K).

m. Typeex - DFT, MTT, ODT, etc. (Refer to Appendix C, Section A, SC Reg 350-3)

n. Typedeploy - Derived from mission; engineer, medical, logistics

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- o. Notes - Any additional information that may be necessary. In addition, if training is associated with host nation personnel/ include unit and number of host nation personnel.
- p. Metlyn - Yes or no; does this exercise answer one of CINCSO's JMETS (Refer to Appendix D, SC Reg 350-3.)
- q. Meltcode - If (P) is yes, which JMETS does it answer? If (P) is no, should be N/A. (Refer to Appendix D, SC Reg 350-3.)
- r. Funded - Yes or no.
- s. Transport - Civ/mil air; Civ/mil sealift.
- t. Threatcon - High, medium, or low; this can be determined by contacting MILGRP or SCJ2.
- u. Eeplan - Yes or no; if threatcon is medium or high, there must be an escape and evasion plan on file with the MILGRP before the TOR can be approved.
- v. Rehdate - Rehearsal date; if none, leave blank.
- w. Ccldate - Date requirements of component deployment checklist will be sent met; component must certify that this has been met before TOR can be approved.
- x. Ssurvdate - Date site survey will begin. Leave blank if there will not be a site survey.
- y. Advondate - Date advon will arrive. Leave blank if no advon.
- z. Mbodydate - Date main body will arrive in country.
- aa. Aardate - Date JULLS AAR will be at SCJ3-DDX. All components must submit an AAR, in JULLS 3.10, NLT 30 days after ENDEX.
- bb. Hrtrain - Date CINCSO's required Human Rights briefings will be completed and name of person who verified briefings. Additionally, components will ensure H/R Training Objectives are incorporated in the Training Plan for all deployments, when appropriate. State Yes or No to indicate if above training objectives have or have not been incorporated.
- cc. POC - Rank, Name, Telephone #, Office Symbol and Message Address for Component POC responsible for managing the DFT.
